 - (i) is a shareholder in, or a director or senior officer of, a corporation that does not offer its securities to the public,
 - (ii) has a controlling interest in or is a director or senior officer of, a corporation that offers its securities to the public, or
 - (iii) is a member of a body,

that has a pecuniary interest in the matter; or

(b) the member is a partner of a person or is in the employment of a person or body that has a pecuniary interest in the matter. R.S.O. 1990, c. M.50, s. 2.

Whereas the move to a circular economy is a global movement, and that the transition of blue box program would go a long way toward this outcome.

Whereas the Township of Tarbutt is supportive of a timely, seamless, and successful transition of Blue Box programs to full financial and operational responsibility by producers of packaging, paper and paper products.

Whereas the Township of Tarbutt is concerned about a recent proposal by the Ministry of Environment, Conservation and Parks that could jeopardize over 135 small, rural, remote and northern community blue box programs across the Province as well as servicing to schools and public spaces;

And whereas the Association of Municipalities of Ontario has requested municipal governments with Blue Box programs to provide an indication of the best date to transition our Blue Box program to full producer responsibility.

Therefore be it resolved that the Township of Tarbutt strongly advocates for language to be included in the regulation that ensures municipalities under 5,000 continue to receive Blue Box servicing as was agreed as part of the Provincial governments Blue Box mediation as well as schools and public spaces.

Further it be resolved that the Township of Tarbutt forward this resolution to the Honorable Jeff Yurek Minister of Environment, conservation and Parks, the Association of Municipalities of Ontario, the Federation of Northeastern Ontario Municipalities and the Rural Ontario Municipalities Association.

WHEREAS the Accessibility for Ontarians with Disabilities Act contemplates the need to consider technical or economic considerations in the implementation of Accessibility Standards;

SALES AGREEMENT

This agreement entered November 1, 2020 between Ferrovial Services Ontario Limited and members of Tarbutt Township provides for the sale of abrasive sand from Ferrovial Services Ontario Limited to Tarbutt Township for winter maintenance of roads within their jurisdiction.

Ferrovial Services Ontario Limited, hereby agrees to sell winter sand to Tarbutt Township at a per tonne price of \$27.71 after 850 tonnes per municipality, the price will be adjusted to \$33.39 per tonne. This product will be available to the municipalities from the date of execution of this Sales Agreement, until May 30th, 2021, at the agreed price.

The sand provided will meet Ministry of Transportation specifications and will be blended with 3% salt by weight volume. The following special provisions apply to this agreement:

- The municipalities shall have access to FS patrol yards at all times for the purpose of loading sand throughout the term of this agreement subject to the following prerequisite:
 - All municipality employees or persons acting under the instructions of a municipality who enter the FS patrol yards shall have attended an induction course provided by FS, and have their name recorded in a register as free to enter. No other person is permitted into the Ferrovial Services patrol yard.
 - All municipality employees must complete a COVID 19 screening prior to entering any FS patrol yard, screening devices will be provided for these items.

The municipalities may use the Ferrovial Services loader positioned at each patrol location for loading of sand onto their trucks. Municipal employees are responsible for the operation of this equipment and liable for damage to the equipment itself, or any structures within the patrol yard. Prior to using the Ferrovial Services front end loading equipment, municipal employees or persons under the direction of a municipality shall provide a copy of a certificate of competence for loader operation from a government approved training provider and their names will be recorded in a register as able to use the equipment. No other persons are permitted to use the equipment

- FS shall provide routine maintenance and fuel for the operation of the end-loader

- FS will provide front end loading equipment with bucket scales to be used for material tracking. Two load tickets are to be printed, one to remain in the loader and attached to the provided clipboard, the other to be sent to the Ferrovial Services head office 452 Albert street east Sault Ste Maire **bi-weekly** with a summary sheet for invoicing. Any overdue invoice payments may result in loss of services.
- FS shall invoice Tarbutt Township for sand loaded every other week throughout the season. Term of payment shall be 30 Days.
- Ferrovial Services Ontario's Mandatory Safety Rules and general safety Best Practices will be shared with municipality employees during the induction course provided by Ferrovial Services, and must be strictly adhered to. In the event of a breach of these policies and procedures, FS reserves the right to withdraw the right of that municipal employee or person under the direction of a municipality from entering Ferrovial Services patrol yards.
- FS shall be advised immediately of any fluid spill from municipality equipment, FS will advise the Ministry Of Environment. FS will oversee and ensure appropriate clean up and containment of spill. The municipality will be responsible for all costs associated to environmental clean-up and proper disposal and any restoration.





RE: Township of Tarbutt & Tarbutt Additional, 2020 Municipal Levy Notice Adjustment

We are reaching out to our Algoma municipalities to update you on changes regarding the provincial funding to public health units.

You will recall that in April 2019, the Provincial Government announced that as of January 1, 2020, the provincial funding share to public health would be reduced from 75% to 70% while municipalities will contribute 30% from 25%. Additionally, the majority of programs that were previously 100% provincially funded would be cost-shared at the new ratios. To help provide additional stability as municipalities began to adapt to shifting funding models, the Government announced they would provide one-time mitigation funding in 2020 to assist all public health units and municipalities to manage this increase. Municipalities were protected from any cost increases resulting from this new cost-sharing formula by capping the increase at no more than 10% of existing municipal costs (based on 2018 expenditures). As a result, APH management budgeted approximately \$808,535 in expected provincial one-time mitigation funding. At that time, we also undertook to minimize any increases in our overall operating costs such that any increase to the municipal levy would only be reflective of the change in the funding formula.

On August 21, 2020, APH received its 2020-2021 Public Health funding approval letters from the Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care. The letter indicated that APH would receive one-time mitigation funding in the amount \$1,037,800 for both the 2020 and 2021 funding years. This funding is designed to ensure that municipalities do not experience any increase as a result of the previously announced cost-sharing changes. Since the levy increase, you received last year from APH was based entirely on the proposed new funding formula, The Board of Health has directed that these funds be returned to the respective municipalities. It should be noted that this process is not consistent in all health units across the province. Other agencies may have included increased operational costs along with the funding formula changes and may not be providing a reimbursement.

The total 2020 levy reimbursement amount for the Township of Tarbutt & Tarbutt Additional is \$1,175.75, and you should receive this on November 13, 2020.

As APH continues to provide Public Health leadership and guidance to the communities within the District of Algoma, the Board continues to take steps to control costs while delivering programs and services outlined in the Ontario Public Health Standards. However, it is not possible to maintain operational costs at a zero increase for two consecutive years. We are in the process of finalizing our 2021 budget during the month of November and will communicate the 2021 projected levy as soon as our budget has been approved. Thank you for your understanding and support during what has been an extremely challenging year.

Re: Investing in Canada Infrastructure Program (ICIP) – COVID-19 Resilience Infrastructure Stream

On October 28, 2020, Ontario announced the COVID-19 Resilience Infrastructure Stream ("COVID stream") under the Investing in Canada Infrastructure Program (ICIP) in Ontario.

Under the new COVID stream, \$250 million in combined federal-provincial funding will be dedicated to local governments across the province. **Your municipality's allocation is \$100,000 for this new stream.**

The federal government has indicated that investments under this stream are to support public infrastructure, defined as tangible capital assets, including temporary infrastructure related to pandemic response, primarily for public use and/or benefit. According to federal parameters, eligible projects include (see Appendix B for full details):

- **Retrofits, Repairs and Upgrades** for municipal, provincial, territorial and indigenous buildings, health infrastructure and educational infrastructure;
- **COVID-19 Response Infrastructure**, including measures to support physical distancing;
- **Active Transportation Infrastructure**, including parks, trails, foot bridges, bike lanes and multi-use paths; and
- **Disaster Mitigation and Adaptation**, including natural infrastructure, flood and fire mitigation, tree planting and related infrastructure.

Municipalities should work with the federal eligibility criteria to identify projects to address COVID-19 responses and resilience, including in municipal/regional owned long-term care homes. Municipalities are also able to partner with not-for-profit and broader public sector organizations (e.g. any public sector body) and submit projects on their behalf, using their municipal allocations. This will be subject to the municipality's own project evaluation prior to submission to the province. Not-for-profits and broader public sector organizations are not eligible to apply on their own. More information will be available on this in the program guidelines.

As with other ICIP streams, projects that have already commenced construction or contain no capital components (i.e. planning projects) are ineligible for funding under this intake. Additionally, costs for land acquisition, infrastructure for tourism or facilities home to a professional sports team, and any project already nominated to the federal government under another ICIP stream are ineligible under the COVID stream.

Municipalities will not be required to cost-share under this stream. The federal government will cover 80% of the total eligible costs associated with any approved project and Ontario will cover 20%, however, total eligible costs for all submitted projects cannot exceed your municipal allocation noted above.

Municipalities will have the opportunity to submit projects for review and approval, but eligible costs associated with any given project cannot exceed \$10 million.

There will be a project cap based on your municipal allocation:

- 1 project submission for those receiving a maximum of \$100,000;
- 2 project submissions for those receiving \$100,001 to a maximum of \$500,000; and,
- 5 project submissions for those receiving \$500,001 and above.

Projects are limited to one of four categories as outlined by the federal government in the list in appendix B. Please contact our delivery team (email below) if you have questions about this. Municipalities can bundle various assets, within one of the four categories, under one project submission.

The federal timelines of this program require all parties to work together quickly to implement funding. Applications will be reviewed and prioritized by the province based on a rolling intake (i.e. first-come, first-served), but the following deadlines will apply:

- Applications for single projects must be submitted to the province through the Transfer Payment Ontario (TPON) system by December 21, 2020;
- Applications for multiple projects must be submitted to the province through the Transfer Payment Ontario (TPON) system by January 7, 2021;
- Projects must have started construction by September 30, 2021; and,
- Projects must have completed construction by December 31, 2021; except for remote communities which will have until December 31, 2022 (see below).

Only projects that meet the above criteria, as well as those that will follow in the provincial program guidelines will be considered for nomination by the Province to the federal government. No deadline extensions will be considered. If you do not submit your application on time, or your project does not start and/or complete by the deadlines required by the federal government, you will lose any

opportunity to access this funding allocation.

As per federal parameters, remote communities will receive additional time and have until December 31, 2022 to complete project construction. Communities who fall under this definition, as per the Canada-Ontario Integrated Bilateral Agreement, are outlined in the attached in Appendix A.

Application materials (i.e. application forms, program guidelines and federal Environmental Assessment/Duty to Consult forms) will become available on the TPON website once the stream has officially launched the week of November 16th. Please check back on the site for updates in the coming weeks.

Lake Huron - Lakewide Action and Management Plan (LAMP)

The Lake Huron Lakewide Action and Management Plan (LAMP) identifies five major threats to water quality in Lake Huron

- Chemical Contaminants,
- Nutrient and Bacterial Pollution,
- Loss of Habitat and Native Species,
- Invasive Species, Climate Change.

Locally in Central Algoma - the major threats are contaminated sediments in the St Mary's River, livestock access to rivers, riverbank erosion, faulty septic systems, loss and degradation of streams and wetlands, lack of protection for coastal wetlands and invasive species.

ACTIVITIES THAT EVERYONE CAN TAKE

Chemical Contaminants - Chemical pollution occurs in many ways including atmospheric deposition; point source; non-point source and existing contaminated bottom sediments. Numerous programs have been established in the last several decades and as a result in the Lake Huron basin taken from air, sediment, fish and wildlife samples are declining.

ACTIVITIES THAT EVERYONE CAN TAKE

The public is encouraged to do its part to prevent chemical contaminants from entering the Lake Huron ecosystem, including watershed streams, lakes, wetlands, and groundwater by undertaking the following actions:

- Follow the 6 R's: rethink, refuse, reduce, reuse, repair, and recycle.
- Take household hazardous materials to hazardous waste collection depots.
- Never burn garbage in barrels, open pits, or outdoor fireplaces, to prevent the release of toxic compounds like dioxins, mercury, lead, etc.
- Use pharmaceutical take-back programs to properly dispose of unused or expired medication.
- Choose eco-friendly household cleaning and personal care products.
- Use more environmentally friendly asphalt-based sealants as an alternative to those with coal tar, which contain toxic substances.
- Consider using natural pest-control methods - not toxic chemicals; and
- Always follow the recommendations found in provincial and state guides/advisories to eating sport fish, especially children and pregnant women.

Nutrients and Bacterial Pollution

Nutrient and bacterial pollution (phosphorus and nitrogen) can lead to nuisance and harmful algal blooms and bacterial pollution can make swimming areas unsafe. Sources may include discharges from municipal wastewater facilities (environmental compliance with operating conditions), agricultural operations, malfunctioning septic tanks and commercial fertilizer on lawns.

ACTIVITIES THAT EVERYONE CAN TAKE

Landowners and the public are encouraged to do their part to prevent nutrient and bacterial pollutants from entering groundwater, streams, lakes, wetlands, and Lake Huron by undertaking the following actions:

- Choose phosphate-free detergents, soaps, and cleaners - use appropriate amounts.

- Avoid using lawn fertilizers.
- Always pick up pet waste.
- Use natural processes to manage stormwater runoff and reduce the number of impervious surfaces.
- Install a rain barrel and plant a rain garden with native plants, shrubs, and trees so that water soaks into the ground.
- Inspect and pump out your septic system regularly.



- Implement improved septic technologies, including conversion of septic systems to municipal or communal sewage systems.
- Incorporate agricultural best management practices, such as grassed swales, filter and/or buffer strips to control and reduce stormwater runoff; and
- Keep cattle out of streams; leave a buffer strip to trap nutrient and sediment runoff; and plant a shelter belt.

Loss of Habitat and Native Species

The main factors contributing to the loss of biological diversity are habitat alteration, destruction and fragmentation of habitat, non-native invasive species, climate change and unsustainable shoreline development.

ACTIVITIES THAT EVERYONE CAN TAKE

Protecting and restoring habitats and species involves the coordination of many different agencies, non-governmental organizations, professions, and the pursuit of management actions by various partners and the public. Here are some suggestions on how to do your part:

- Maintain natural vegetation along the coast and streams.
- Resist the urge to “tidy up” the beach. Natural vegetation and debris serve as habitat.



- Plant native trees and shrubs on your property.
- Get involved with shoreline clean up events.
- Consider working with neighbours, not-for-profit organizations, and municipalities, to restore beach-dune health by installing sand fencing and planting dune grasses.
- Stay on constructed beach and dune paths and avoid trampling the sparse and fragile vegetation in these areas.
- Support and/or volunteer with local conservation authorities, stewardship councils and non-governmental environmental organizations.
- Access shoreline stewardship guides for advice, see <https://www.lakehuron.ca/stewardship-plansand-guides>; and
- Share your knowledge with your friends, neighbours, cottage renters or even strangers, about the rarity and ecological importance of each of the special shoreline types.

Invasive Species

The introduction, establishment and spread of invasive species are significant threats to water quality and biodiversity. Lamprey, Dreissend mussels, and Round Goby are but a few. Recreational activities can spread invasive species - related to unknowingly transferring eggs of invasive species on watercraft.

ACTIVITIES THAT EVERYONE CAN TAKE

Learn how Canada and the U.S. are contributing to aquatic invasive species science through the work of federal scientists, collaboration with national and international interest groups, and funding of partnership projects.

- Learn how to identify, report, and stop the spread of Phragmites.
- Use non-invasive plants for your yard or garden.
- Clean your boots before you hike in a new area to prevent the spread of weeds, seeds and pathogens.
- Drain and clean your boat before using it on a different body of water.



- Do not move firewood that can harbor forest pests; Do not release aquarium fish and plants, live bait or other exotic animals into the wild.
- Volunteer at a local park to help remove invasive species. Help educate others about the threat.

Climate Change

Impacts from climate change include warming air and water temperatures, changing precipitation patterns, decreased ice coverage and water level fluctuations. These climate-related impacts interact with one another and pose a challenge to management. Climate change adaptive measures are also required to build resilience.

ACTIVITIES THAT EVERYONE CAN TAKE

Personal Climate Change Mitigation Actions

Here are some solutions that you can use to reduce your personal contribution to greenhouse gas emissions:

- Be energy efficient by greening your home. Change your lightbulbs to LED bulbs; turn off the lights and unplug electronics and appliances when not in use; look for ENERGY STAR labels when buying new electronics or appliances; heat and cool smartly; and seal and insulate your home. You will also save money on your electricity bill!
- Choose green power. Switch your energy source to renewable energy such as wind or solar.
- Plant trees! Trees should be native or adapted to the local climate. Trees sequester carbon, helping to remove carbon dioxide and other greenhouse gases from the air.



- Choose sustainable transportation. Transportation produces about 14% of global greenhouse gas emissions (IPCC, 2014). Walk, cycle, carpool, or take public transit when you can. Fly less or consider taking buses or trains. Purchase a smaller, fuel efficient, low-greenhouse gas vehicle. Drive efficiently.

- Conserve water. Take shorter showers; install low-flow shower heads and toilets. Use the dishwasher and washing machine only when you have full loads. Wash clothes in cold water.

- Eat locally. Buy organic and locally grown food, as it does not have to travel as far. Avoid buying processed foods.

- Reduce your waste. Garbage buried in landfills produces methane, a potent greenhouse gas. Compost when you can. Recycle paper, plastic, metal, and glass. Buy products with minimal packaging. Buy less stuff.



- Follow the 6 Rs of Sustainability: Rethink, refuse, reduce, reuse, repair, and recycle.

- Get involved and informed! Follow the latest news on climate change, voice your concerns via social media, and spread the word to your family and friends!

The Municipality of Huron Shores, its Ad Hoc Broadband Committee and the presentation team have been very busy the past few months, engaging with the public and private sector to ensure H&M COFI meets your Internet requirements for many years to come. This letter serves to update you on our applications' progress and provide a reminder of why a Community Owned Fibre Infrastructure is the best for our region.

We were delighted to receive the news of the approval for Stage Two of our project for the Government of Ontario's Improving Connectivity for Ontario (ICON) program. The team is now completing the detailed submission due, in part, by 11 December, with final details in mid-January. A successful ICON application could provide up to 25% funding for H&M COFI.

The Federal Government recently announced its Universal Broadband Fund (UBF), which we have all been waiting for. We are in the process of preparing our submission for the UBF grants and expect to include a proposal for the Rapid Response Stream. Before the announcement and following it, the presentation team met with a multitude of ministers and their staff at provincial and federal levels of government involved with Internet broadband. Presentations have been to FedNor Staff, Universal Broadband Fund (UBF) Staff, Parliamentary Secretary MP Terry Sheehan, Minister Greg Rickford and Minister Maryam Monsef. I explained why a community-owned network is the best solution for our region, and all feedback was positive. Given the comments I received from our attendees to the recent Canadian Rural and Remote Broadband Conference and other Rural Broadband announcement events, many leaders at all three government levels are affirming the benefits of community ownership.

If you have been listening to regional morning radio, I have been interviewed and presented our case in a public forum. Several local and regional newspapers have carried interviews regarding H&M COFI, all with the intent of getting the word out. Through these interviews, I learned of Hearst Connect, a small community-owned fibre network that brings broadband Internet to their community and ensures those funds remain in their municipality.

The realization of H&M COFI seeks to bring gigabit data rates to our homes and businesses with no data caps while ensuring 100% coverage for the region. The H&M COFI, municipal level corporation, will own the infrastructure and allow any viable Internet Service Provider (ISP) to operate on the network. The ability to choose an ISP will enable homes and businesses to select one that best meets their budget and specialty package offerings. H&M COFI will charge a floor price, wholesale price, if you will, with the profits returning to the community. We should ask ourselves, why would we not want a share of the revenue the telecommunication dollar spent in the region.

The Municipality of Huron Shores has posted H&M COFI information as well as links to its partners. This information expands on and explains the benefits of a community-owned network. Also, in partnership with ROCK Networks, a data collection tool will soon be available for homes and businesses to register for additional information regarding the performances and pricing models we expect to be available. The registry will allow future customers to obtain information about H&M COFI and its benefits to the communities and region.

With events occurring quickly, H&M COFI is asking that whenever you have a chance to lobby on our behalf, please do so. It directly benefits you and your constituents. We request that you provide a link on your respective websites to the H&M COFI information website. We would also greatly appreciate hearing from the Municipalities and First Nations who have not yet supplied Clerk/Administrator Tonelli (debbie@huronshores.ca) with your contact information.

In summary, a lot has occurred over the past few months and we are getting the word out. H&M COFI is proceeding with funding applications and your support is key to that success. Lastly, H&M COFI is about guaranteeing our future through true broadband internet for the region. It will, in turn, ensure our best and brightest remain or return to the region and help grow our communities.

As part of our ongoing initiatives in Broadband, the Huron North Community Economic Alliance is supporting [Leepfrog Telecom](#) in an application to the [Rapid Response Stream](#) of the [Universal Broadband Fund](#).

Leepfrog Telecom is an Internet Service Provider (ISP) willing to invest in our communities to bring high speed internet connectivity to foster economic growth, improve community access to healthcare and education while ensuring rural communities in Northern Ontario are not left behind. Leepfrog Telecom has proposed a solution that uses a combination of WIFI and new Television White Space (TVWS) technology, bringing 50/10 Mbps broadband internet access to residences of the community. Leepfrog Telecom will leverage the lessons learned from their successful project in Iron Bridge to extend the capability to other communities along the North Shore at minimal cost to the community.

The [Rapid Response Stream](#) of the federal Universal Broadband Fund is designed to enhance household access to high-speed Internet in the very short term, or before November 15, 2021, to address immediate broadband needs and to contribute to the acceleration of the connectivity timelines and ambitions of the [Universal Broadband Fund](#). Applications for the

Rapid Response Stream will be accepted on an ongoing basis until January 15, 2021 and selected as they are received. The federal government encourages potential applicants to apply as early as possible, and as such, we are working on a short timeline to submit our application before Christmas.

As Leepfrog prepares their application in the coming weeks, they will require cooperation and support from our communities. The application will require 3 items from our communities:

- 1. A letters of support for the project,**
- 2. Potential locations for towers on municipal or First Nation Land, as well as, if applicable**
- 3. Permission for easements may be required as we move forward through the application process.**

Foundational to economic development is the need for reliable broadband across our member communities. Partnerships like this help to facilitate an accountable, affordable, and high-quality telecommunications network to service anticipated residential and commercial needs. This service will be fundamental to the future economic prosperity, social development and educational needs of the HNCEA region.

This is an exciting step forward in getting HNCEA communities connected and will make up one of what we hope to be many broadband initiatives in this region. **Please designate a point of contact in your community for future communication regarding this application.**

Throughout the application process, we will be seeking assistance from Sault Ste Marie Innovation Centre (SSMIC) in obtaining data necessary for the application.

Member Update - November 2020

November 13th, 2020

Hello Everyone,

October and November have been an exciting time for us and many of our partners. We held our annual general meeting on October 29th. We have welcomed Councillors Keith Hoback of the Township of Plummer Additional and Sandra Trudel of the Town of Spanish to the Board of Directors. The Board of Directors also appointed Wilma Bissiallon of Serpent River First Nation to be the new Chair. Jock Pirrie of Huron Shores will continue in his position as Vice Chair and Betty Ann Dunbar of Blind River will return to her role as secretary/treasurer.

Here is what the staff has been up to over the past two months:

Broadband

Our Broadband Advisory Council (BAC) has continued to meet bi-weekly. The BAC will continue to invite technology partners to present their technology solutions and business models. With the opening of the Universal Broadband fund, our team is preparing to submit an application to the Rapid Response stream and to initiate an RFP process to partner with a service provider to apply to the broader fund. The Board of Directors has also approved the drafting of a letter to Starlink to indicate that HNCEA region wishes to be considered for beta testing of their new satellite internet service.

As part of our background research for broadband, we are seeking information on current broadband in municipally controlled locations (Town Halls, Schools, Hospitals, Community Centres, Public Works). With these locations, we would also like the current level of service, annual broadband spending and information on current service levels, including providers, speeds and pricing. If you can share this information with us, it could go a long way in increasing our chances of receiving funding

Investment Readiness and Attraction

We continued working with communities to complete the Government of Ontario's Investment Readiness Test. Thank you to the staff who have taken the time to complete the test. This is an important first step in developing a regional investment attraction and retention strategy. We are also exploring what ways we can help address common gaps among communities.

Tourism and Agriculture

We are currently surveying businesses to find the best time to hold our sector forums.

Business Incubator

As part of exploring the feasibility of a business incubator for the HNCEA area, we brought together EDOs and relevant organizations to discuss. From these discussions, we are exploring the potential to have a HNCEA business portal, podcasts on topics relevant to local businesses, quarterly meetings between all relevant organizations to share information as well as providing a follow-up service to see how entrepreneurs are doing after seeking advice or applying for funding.

Workshops, Webinars and Workforce Development

We worked with Suzanne Faubert-Astles of ENDM to hold a funders forum on October 23rd to discuss funding applications and funding options. We have also been sharing programs related to helping businesses with adopting digital technologies.

Though we are in an unprecedented time, we will continue to work towards our objectives by developing projects that best serve the area.
